Instructions for Authors

World Journal of Biological Research (WJBR) is an international journal that publishes biological quality research papers in **English** or **French**. Original research articles that are accepted after a peer-review process are published in full on the web and immediately made freely available to all. Articles from the full spectrum of biology are appropriate for consideration, for example: molecular biology, biotechnology genetics, botany, zoology, conservation biology...

Electronic submission of manuscripts is strongly encouraged, provided that the text, tables, and figures are included in a single Microsoft Word file (preferably in Arial font).

A manuscript number will be mailed within three working days.

The **cover letter** should include the corresponding author's full address and telephone/fax numbers and should be in an e-mail message sent to the Editor-in-chief, with the file, whose name should begin with the first author's surname, as an attachment.

Article Types

Three types of manuscripts may be submitted to WJBR:

Full length articles: These should describe new and carefully confirmed findings, and experimental procedures should be given in sufficient detail for others to verify the

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Short Communications: A Short Communication is suitable for recording the results of complete small investigations or giving details of new models or hypotheses, gene isolation and identification, innovative methods, techniques or apparatus.. Short communications are 2 to 4 printed pages (about 6 to 12 manuscript pages) in length.

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Full length articles

All portions of the manuscript must be typed double-spaced and all pages numbered starting from the title page.

The **Title** should be a brief phrase describing the contents of the paper. This page should include the authors' full names and affiliations, the name of the corresponding author along with phone, fax and E-mail information. Present addresses of authors should appear as a footnote.

The **Abstract** should be completely self-explanatory, briefly present the topic, state the scope of the experiments, indicate significant

data, and point out major findings and conclusions. The Abstract should not exceed 250 words in length. The abstract should be followed by about 3 to 6 **key words**.

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Materials and methods should be complete enough to allow experiments to be reproduced. However, only truly new procedures should be described in detail; previously published procedures should be cited, and important modifications of published procedures should be mentioned briefly. Capitalize trade names and include the manufacturer's name and address. Subheadings should be used. Methods in general use need not be described in detail.

Results should be presented with clarity and precision. The results should be written in the past tense when describing findings in the authors' experiments. Previously published findings should be written in the present tense. Results should be explained, but largely without referring to the literature. Discussion, speculation and detailed interpretation of data should not be included in the Results but should be put into the Discussion section.
